

# Undergraduate Electee Requirements

## Fall 2025

### Tau Beta Pi MI-G

**The following is a list of the requirements to join Tau Beta Pi MI-G**

#### **I. REQUIRED MEETINGS**

If you cannot attend a meeting, first email the Vice President at [tbp.vicepresident@umich.edu](mailto:tbp.vicepresident@umich.edu). Be sure to look over a copy of the meeting's agenda at For Members → Access History → Meeting Minutes on the website. You must then make up the meeting with one extra hour of service or one extra social event, approved by the Vice President. Elections can only be made up with a service hour. All meetings (except Initiation/Banquet) will begin at 6:30pm. See Information Page for locations.

- i. First General - September 2<sup>nd</sup>
- ii. Second General - September 16<sup>th</sup>
- iii. Third General - October 7<sup>th</sup>
- iv. Fourth General - November 4<sup>th</sup>
- v. Elections - November 18<sup>th</sup>
- vi. Fifth General - December 2<sup>nd</sup>
- vii. Initiation & Banquet - December 6<sup>th</sup>

#### **II. 16 SERVICE HOURS**

We recommend you complete at least 4 hours by Second Actives (September 30<sup>th</sup>) and you are required to complete 8 hours by Third Actives (October 28<sup>th</sup>). A portion of your 16 hours will come from the following mandatory events. You may do a maximum of 5 independent hours of service (hours not associated with Tau Beta Pi) provided you show adequate proof of your involvement, and that the hours do not count for another society.

*Signing up for a service project is a commitment to attend; you must un-sign up at least 24 hours in advance or you will have to complete an extra hour of service projects.*

##### **i. Volunteer for two hours at the Fall Engineering Career Fair.**

Along with the Society of Women Engineers (SWE), TBP is one of the student organizations that co-runs the Fall Engineering Career Fair. All electees are required to volunteer at least 2 hours at the Career Fair; any additional hours will count towards your remaining service hours. Sign up for slots at [tbpmig.org/CF-volunteering](http://tbpmig.org/CF-volunteering). Please reach out to the Vice President if you are unable to fulfill this requirement.

##### **ii. Volunteer for one hour of TBP tutoring.**

Our tutoring service pairs students interested in receiving tutoring (mainly for intro-level classes) with qualified TBP tutors. TBP tutors will meet with the student several times throughout the semester and receive service hour credit for the hours they have spent tutoring as verified by the student. Tutoring sign-ups are due before New Initiatives II (October 14<sup>th</sup>), but you do not have to complete them by this date! We also provide group tutoring in collaboration with other organizations where students can come and go freely, which also counts as tutoring hours.

##### **iii. Participate in at least 4 hours of K-12 Outreach service events.**

Each electee must participate in at least one approved K-12 Outreach event for a minimum of 4 hours. Any hours over this requirement will count towards your remaining service hours. The following events can count to fill this requirement:

- i. **MindSETs:** September 27<sup>th</sup>, October 19<sup>th</sup>, November 9<sup>th</sup>

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- ii. **Cub Scouts Day:** November 16<sup>th</sup>
  - iii. **Merit Badge Days:** September 28<sup>th</sup>, October 26<sup>th</sup>
  - iv. **Engineering Day:** November 8<sup>th</sup>

*\*\*\*In order to volunteer at any of the K-12 events, you must turn in a university background check form and complete the Scouting America (formerly Boy Scouts of America) Youth Protection Training at [tbpmig.org/ypt](http://tbpmig.org/ypt). See the page titled "Forms for Working with Minors - Fall 2025" for details on the forms due **September 16<sup>th</sup>**.*

### III. 2 SOCIAL EVENTS

Social events include game nights, movie nights, TG's, intersociety events, etc. One of these activities should be completed by Third Actives (October 28<sup>th</sup>).

### IV. 2 PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT EVENTS

Professional development events include things such as corporate information sessions, resume reviews, professional headshots, or mock interviews.

### V. ELECTEE TEAM MEETINGS

You must attend all three of your electee team meetings. Contact your electee team lead or the vice president if you are unable to make one of your team meetings.

### VI. CHARACTER EVALUATION

You must complete an Electee Interview Questionnaire regarding exemplary character and submit your answers, along with a copy of your resume, to the website by **Monday, September 15<sup>th</sup>**. The interview questionnaire can be found under Electee Resources on the website ([tbp.engin.umich.edu](http://tbp.engin.umich.edu)). Your resume should be submitted to your website profile. Interviews last about 25 minutes and starts no later than 5 minutes after start time, which will require a total commitment of 30 minutes. Interviews will take place in person in the Pierpont Center Room and Pierpont Corner Room on September 17<sup>th</sup>-19<sup>th</sup> and dress code is business casual. **Sign up for your interview on the website.**

### VII. MENTORSHIP PROGRAM - "TBPALS"

You must participate in a TBPals group event. TBPals is designed to foster connections between electees from different electee teams as well as active members. You will be contacted soon for more information.

### VIII. PAPERWORK

**All paperwork should be turned in by Fifth General (December 2<sup>nd</sup>) at the TBP Office (1226 EECS), at meetings, or directly to the Vice President via email or Slack.**

#### i. Catalog Cards

You must complete a catalog card on the Nationals website to be allowed to elect. You will receive more information on this from the Secretary, Moon Hazarika, later in the semester. **Catalog cards must be completed by October 28<sup>th</sup>.**

#### ii. 6 Casual Peer Interviews

The interviews are to get to know your fellow members in Tau Beta Pi a little better. These interviews should be casual. At least two of the people interviewed must be active members. Think of 6 creative questions to ask members — no mundane questions will be accepted ("What is your favorite color?"). Please record the responses of your interviewees on paper or in a Google or Word document. If possible, please have your interview subject sign the sheet afterwards. The first electee team meeting is dedicated to completing your peer interviews!

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iii. **Electee Exam**

The electee exam tests your knowledge of the history of TBP and our chapter. It is not meant to be stressful. We encourage you to work on it together and drop by office hours to ask officers for answers! Please don't ask for answers via e-mail — we want to get to know you!

**IX. ONE-TIME MEMBERSHIP FEE OF \$105.**

A one-time fee to be a member of Tau Beta Pi, which pays for electee supplies, the banquet, your bent, your certificate, your lifetime membership, etc. given to the Treasurer, Jaccob Bell. Checks should be made out to Tau Beta Pi. Cash is also accepted. **This is also due by Fifth General (December 2<sup>nd</sup>).** You will receive more information about how to pay dues via email later in the semester. **If this fee poses a significant financial burden, please reach out to the Vice President for more information about a fee waiver as soon as possible.**



# Character Evaluation - Fall 2025

Exemplary character is one of the requisites for membership in Tau Beta Pi. In addition to being active members of the engineering community, Tau Beta Pi members must meet the **highest standards of moral character**. Our chapter will assess your character through written essays and an interview.

## Electee Interview Questionnaire:

The first component of the character assessment in Tau Beta Pi is the Electee Interview Questionnaire. You will be required to complete the questionnaire with three fun questions, three short answer questions, and one essay question. The questionnaire can be found under Members → Electee Resources and submitted to the website, while your résumé should be submitted to your website profile. Submit your **questionnaire responses and résumé** by **Monday, September 15<sup>th</sup>**.

Some of the short answer questions will provide you with the opportunity to share a part of your personality with us. Others will ask for your opinion on topics related to academic integrity. While some may not directly relate to your character, these questions will allow us to better understand you and your thinking.

As an organization that stresses the importance of exemplary character in our members, the essay is a **crucial** part of character assessment. This (one page) essay is a rather open-ended assignment, and we encourage you to get creative with your description. Nevertheless, exemplary character is not an arbitrary concept, and we are looking for specific evidence that you know what this important quality means. Tau Beta Pi members should meet the highest standard of moral character. The quotes on the following page may help inspire you on the subject of exemplary character, but don't limit yourself to those ideas.

The questionnaire can be found and completed under **Members → Electee Resources at [tbp.engin.umich.edu](http://tbp.engin.umich.edu)**. Be ready to discuss your answers during your interview.

## Interviews:

The interview is the most important part of character assessment. Interviews will be held in-person on **September 17<sup>th</sup>-19<sup>th</sup>** in the Pierpont Center Room and Pierpont Corner Room. You must sign up for an interview slot. The interview will take 30 minutes, and you will be interviewed by one or two of our Active members. Dress is business casual. Electees can be denied membership on the basis of a negative interview, so take the process seriously. Don't stress too much about this, though, because it rarely happens. Interviewers will review the résumé and the answers to the Electee Interview Questionnaire you submitted by **Monday, September 15<sup>th</sup>**.

# Forms for Working with Minors

## Fall 2025

The University of Michigan, Ann Arbor Public Schools, and Scouting America (formerly Boy Scouts of America) require anyone volunteering with children to complete background checks. This means that in order for anyone to volunteer and interact in any way with youth at TBP Events, they must complete a background check form. **Before you can complete the background check, you need to opt-in to the process by filling out the background check opt-in form ([tbpmig.org/opt-in](http://tbpmig.org/opt-in)). Please do this as soon as you can.** After you do, the K-12 officers will submit your name to receive a background check, and in the days after, you will receive an email from a third-party (GIS) to complete a background check form (check your spam). **You must submit a screenshot of the end of the survey by September 16<sup>th</sup> (Second General) in order to volunteer with youth at MindSET, Cub Scouts Day, Merit Badge Day, or Engineering Day. You will not receive a confirmation email unless something is flagged.** If you are unable or unwilling to complete the form and submit the background check, your participation at K-12 events will be limited to roles that ensure non-interaction with youth.

The University of Michigan requires that all individuals volunteering with minors also complete training. To fulfill this training requirement, Tau Beta Pi is requiring members to complete Youth Protection Training, offered through Scouting America (formerly Boy Scouts of America). It takes around an hour to complete and can be found at [tbpmig.org/ypt](http://tbpmig.org/ypt). You will need to create an account before proceeding to take the training online, and after completing online training, you must save your certificate as a PDF document and send it to the K-12 officers.

Submit the screenshot of the background check and the YPT certification at [tbpmig.org/ypt-confirm](http://tbpmig.org/ypt-confirm). If you have any questions about the background check or training, or if you do not wish to complete the background check, please contact the K-12 officers, Aidan Shores and Natalie Garvey ([tbp.k12outreach@umich.edu](mailto:tbp.k12outreach@umich.edu)).

**To summarize, please complete the following by 2nd Gen (September 16<sup>th</sup>):**

1. University background check opt-in AND follow-up third-party form.
2. Scouting America (formerly Boy Scouts of America) Youth Protection Training (YPT) at [tbpmig.org/ypt](http://tbpmig.org/ypt). Submit the certificate that will be emailed to you to [tbpmig.org/ypt-confirm](http://tbpmig.org/ypt-confirm).

\*If you miss any of these deadlines but wish to participate in events involving youth, you may contact the K-12 Officers to check if there is enough time to complete the background check prior to the event.



# Service Project Descriptions

## Fall 2025

The following projects and descriptions are examples of some of the service projects that our chapter has carried out in the past. The complete list of service projects that will be done this semester is uncertain due to the constantly evolving opportunities our members discover. However, this list should give you a good sense of the different types of service projects that we undertake. If you see an event you'd like to participate in that hasn't been scheduled, you may also take the lead on it yourself. This semester is a great time to have creative ideas and take advantage of TBP resources for service events. Also, if we have a large amount of electees and general motivation to do larger scale community service, we have a community outreach plan set up that consists of a lot of groundwork/direct interaction with the Michigan/Ann Arbor community. If you are interested in any of this please contact Michael Capitani([tbp.service@umich.edu](mailto:tbp.service@umich.edu)); it is never too early to start getting involved in leadership. Note that the list below is only a taste of the service projects we have carried out.

**Ann Arbor Natural Area Preservation Stewardship Workdays:** Ann Arbor Natural Area Preservation (NAP) is a section of the Ann Arbor Government that specializes in the preservation of public parks and nature reserves. NAP hosts weekend Stewardship Workdays that welcome groups of volunteers to help remove invasive plant species to preserve biodiversity.

**Ann Arbor Probity Marathon:** TBP has had the opportunity to volunteer with set-up and awards for the large Ann Arbor Probity Marathon.

**Cub Scouts Day:** Cub Scouts Engineering Day is a TBP-organized event for local Cub Scouts troops to receive their engineering badges. Activities include bridge building, egg drop, circuits, and floor plan. Volunteers are needed to help run these stations and to lead groups of Cub Scouts through the stations.

**Engineering Day for Detroit:** Engineering Day for Detroit is a full day K-12 event that targets Detroit school districts. Previous modules include bridge building, egg drop, and sphero coding.

**FIRST Robotics with FAMNM:** TBP, in association with the FIRST Alumni and Mentors Network at Michigan (FAMNM), has become involved with volunteering for local FIRST robotics competitions.

**Hands-On Musuem:** The Ann Arbor Hands-On Museum aims to inspire people to discover the wonder of STEM. Have fun with kids while learning cool science facts! Past events include helping children make their own microbes, exploring unique musical instruments, and celebrating DNA day.

**Kiwanis Thrift Sale:** Kiwanis Thrift Sale is one of the largest thrift sales in Ann Arbor and is run completely by volunteers. They are always looking for more help with sorting, transporting, and the sale of donated goods.

**KnitWits:** KnitWits helps the less fortunate during the cold winters by creating warm clothes from donated material. We tie together scraps of fleece to make blankets, hats, and scarves for the homeless here in Ann Arbor. No experience is necessary; instructions and materials all provided!

**Maize & Blue Cupboard North Campus Food Distribution:** Maize & Blue Cupboard is a free food pantry located on Central Campus that holds bi-weekly North Campus distribution events. The goal of these events is to supply students on North Campus with fresh produce and combat food insecurity.

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**Merit Badge Day:** Merit Badge Day (MBD) is a TBP-organized event for Scouting troops to receive their merit badges with an emphasis on engineering and technology. Activities include learning binary, arduino, soldering, and more. Volunteers spend the day in small groups guiding Scouts through the activities.

**MindSET:** MindSET is a K-12 program where we invite students from local school districts to come learn about engineering concepts through rotating modules. Previous modules include: making ice cream, sphero robot coding, and cardboard guitar.

**NEST:** NEST (New Engineering Futures For Tomorrow) is a yearly TBP competition where teams of students work together to present "Engineered for the Greater Good Solutions" at convention. Previous topics include waste management and resource insecurity.

**University of Michigan Science Olympiad:** University of Michigan Science Olympiad (UMSO) provides an excellent opportunity for both middle school and high school science olympiad teams to compete in a variety of STEM activities. TBP has provided dozens of volunteers to help grade and supervise events.

**Zooniverse:** Zooniverse is a completely virtual service opportunity that sees volunteers classifying elements for large-scale data sets. Topics include cosmology, biology, history, and many more!


